Administration

The Board of Health

The Board of Health is comprised of five members to represent the citizens of Preble County. Four of the Board members are appointed by the District Advisory Council (which is comprised of the leaders of all municipal corporations in the county including townships, villages, cities, and County Commissioners). The other Board member is appointed by the Mayor of the City of Eaton. By Ohio law, at least one Board member must be a licensed Physician. Board members are appointed for a term of five years.

George E. Henry serves as the President, represents the City of Eaton, term expires in March 2026.
JoEllen Tapalman serves as President Pro Tempore, represents the County, term expires March 2025.
Dr. Peter Sambol serves as the Board Physician, represents the County, RETIRED April 2024.
Lori J. George represents the County, term expires in March 2028.
Ron Wesler represents the County District Licensing Council (DLC), term expires in March 2027.

The Health Commissioner

The Health Commissioner is Scott Wilford, and he has served in this role since October 2022. Scott directs the daily operations of the agency as it serves the public health needs of 40,999 people in Preble County. Scott is responsible for all policy development, financial decisions, staffing, workforce training, programming, grant management, and strategic leadership. He ensures that resources are utilized effectively and efficiently to maximize return-on-investment while working with his team to address current community health needs and anticipate future public health threats. One of his biggest priorities is ensuring that the agency provides exceptional customer service to the public.

What's in this report?

Annual reports are usually filled with numbers that aren't all that useful without context. Instead, we want to highlight the most important things that happened in each of our primary programs during 2024. Our hope is that you see how relevant public health programs operate in Preble County.

Vital Statistics

Birth Certificates can be issued through our office for anyone born in the state of Ohio. Our office issued **982 birth certificates** in 2024.

In 2024, Preble County had 12 home births/out of institution births.

Death Certificates can be issued for anyone who passes away in Preble County. In 2024, Preble County had 307 deaths and our office issued **1,329 death certificates**. In 2023, Preble County had 292 deaths. In 2024, the most common causes of death were (in no particular order): **heart related, cancer, vehicle accidents, cerebrovascular disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary diseases, accidental drug overdoses and suicide**.

Both birth and death certificates can be purchased for \$22.00 each copy.

Our staff continues to work with the Ohio Department of Health to correct errors found on birth and death records. We also strive to help the public to the best of our ability with any issues regarding birth and death records.



Community Health and Safety

Through generous donations from EvenFlo and the Ohio Buckles Buckeyes program, our certified car seat technicians were able to **install 38 free child safety seats for our low-income Preble County residents**. Participants received in-person education about the proper use of car seats and an in-car demonstration of how to correctly install the seat in a vehicle.



In 2000, Ohio House Bill 448 mandated Boards in all Ohio Counties to review the deaths of children under 18 years of age and formulate data-driven recommendations to prevent future child deaths. The Child Fatality Review Board reviewed five child death cases in 2024.

As part of the state of Ohio initiative to combat infant mortality, PCPH has partnered with Cribs for Kids® to ensure infants have a safe sleeping environment. Babies who sleep on couches, in bed with others, or on their stomachs are more likely to die suddenly from an unexpected cause. Preble County promotes the **ABCs** of infant safe sleep practices - place infants **A**lone, on their **B**ack, in a **C**rib. Sixteen Pack and Play Cribettes with safe sleep kits were distributed in 2024.

Did You Know

PCPH employs 18 people to serve ~41,000 residents with essential public health services. Talk about doing a lot with a little! Our budget is one of the smallest in the county, but our preventative services save the healthcare system real money. Like to the tune of saving \$15 in healthcare costs for every \$1 spent on public health in Preble.

Emergency Preparedness

The eclipse took place in Preble County on April 8, 2024 at a 3:08 pm with totality lasting approximately 3 minutes. Through coordinated preparedness, there were no adverse incidents.

The Health Department participated in Regional Exercises involving a chemical release scenario and a radiation incident scenario. The radiation incident scenario involved the setting up of a Community Reception Center.

The Preble County Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) has been actively involved in preparing for any type of future event. Our response efforts wouldn't be possible without these incredible volunteers. Environmental Health

The Environmental Health program works to protect the community from environmental hazards through the inspection of various programs, including food safety, private water and sewage systems, nuisances and rabies, public swimming pools, campgrounds, and beaches.

The Food Safety Program focuses on the health and safety of the public by inspecting just over 200 licensed facilities throughout the county. Temporary food service operations at festivals are individually inspected. We pride ourselves in fostering a positive relationship with these facilities through education about food safety and transparency of expectations.

The Environmental Health Sewage and Water Program includes the inspection of new and existing private water and private sewage systems, as well as the Operation & Maintenance (O&M) program. Through the O&M program, we inspect onsite septic systems on a 1-year, 5-year, or 10-year rotation based on the system's complexity. These inspections are performed to ensure the septic system is operating properly and does not pose a threat to public health.

The Environmental Health Nuisance Program responds to and investigates public health nuisances. A public health nuisance includes inadequate conditions of one's property that threatens, or may threaten, the health of an individual or community. Examples of public health nuisances include the accumulation of trash, rodent infestations, and dilapidated structures.

The Environmental Health Rabies Program responds to and investigates animal bites, whether it was animal to animal, or animal to human. Rabies is a viral disease that is easily transmitted through the bite of a rabid mammal and there is no known cure.

Nursing and Clinical Services

PCPH Nursing Clinic offers childhood, teen, and adult vaccines. We bill most insurances and offer discounted pricing or vaccine assistance programs for those with no insurance. During 2024, our Registered Nurses administered over 1,400 child and adult immunizations, flu and COVID-19 vaccines. Our nurses serve as a resource to district school nurses and local practitioners for immunization education and vaccine schedule updates.

Through the provision of safe affordable immunizations, the public is protected from vaccine preventable diseases such as Chickenpox, Diphtheria, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Human Papillomavirus, Influenza, Measles, Meningococcal Meningitis, Mumps, Pertussis, Pneumonia, Polio, Rotavirus, Rubella, and Tetanus.



PCPH nurses serve 169 children and families through the Complex Medical Help (CMH) program. Children from birth to 25 years of age with chronic medical conditions receive case management, care coordination, and home visits from our public health nurses.

Our nurses also offer TB testing, pregnancy testing, childhood lead case management, communicable disease investigation and education, resources, and referrals.

Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

The WIC Program provides both nutritious foods and nutrition education to income eligible participants. Our participants purchase healthy foods with their WIC Nutrition Card, including milk, cheese and yogurt, whole grains, fruits and vegetables, as well as protein foods such as eggs, beans, peanut butter and canned fish. Infants who are not breastfed receive infant formulas. Our two local vendors are Kroger and Walmart in Eaton. We distribute Farmers' Market Nutrition Program coupons in the summer. Ninety-nine (99) sets of coupons were given to our families in 2024, and \$1,850 worth were redeemed on locally grown produce, mostly at Today's Harvest in New Paris.

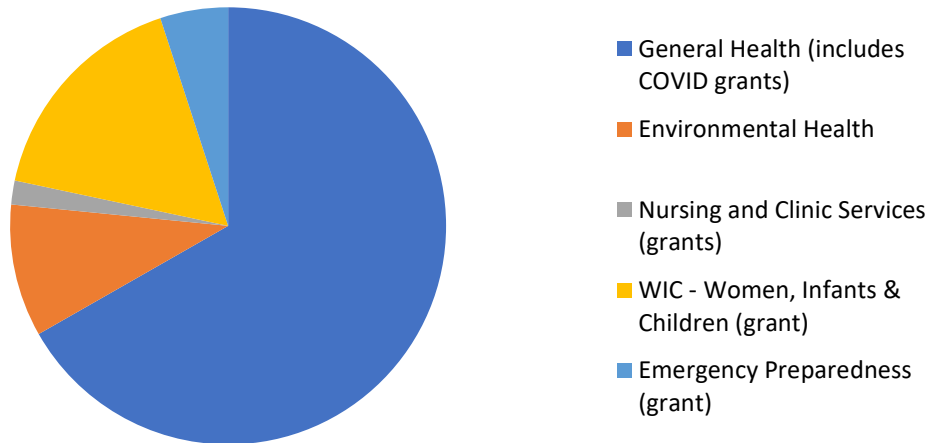


In 2024 our average caseload, or number of individuals receiving food benefits, was 624 per month. We served about 133 women, 141 infants, and 388 children each month. Everyone received nutrition education on a quarterly basis, which came to an average of 227 nutrition education contacts per month. Many of these education sessions are geared toward the participant's own desired health outcome, and are provided by a registered dietitian and a registered nurse.

Breastfeeding support is a cornerstone of WIC services. This is provided by a WIC mom breastfeeding peer helper, and our two health professionals who are International Board-Certified Lactation Consultants. We had a breastfeeding initiation rate of 76%, and we have an average of 34% of infants (newborn to 1 year) who are breastfeeding. We co-lead the Breast Friends of Preble County support group, and offer breastfeeding help through our peer helper phone line 24/7.

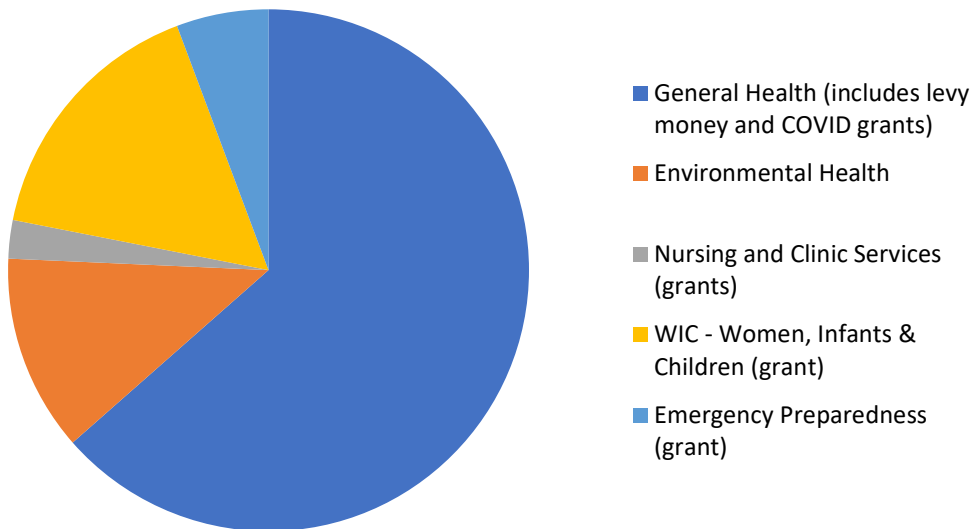
Financial Picture

2024 PCPH Revenue

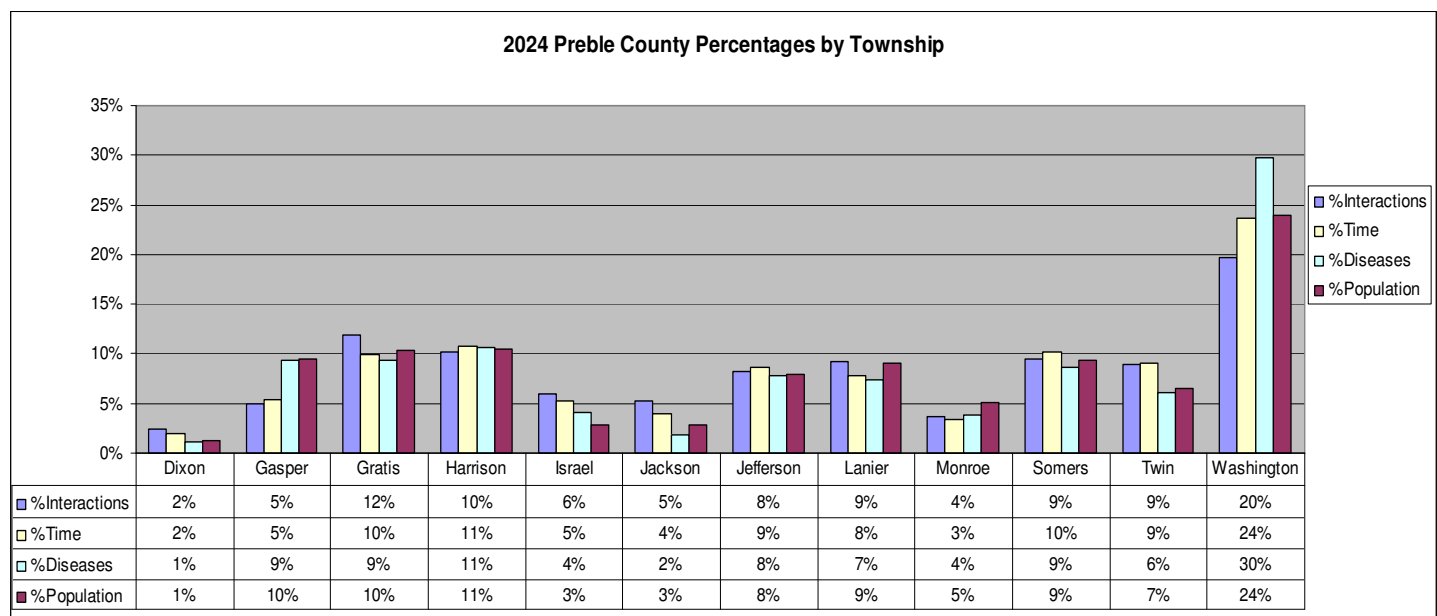

Preble County Public Health continues to be fiscally responsible by saving and spending in a manner that serves the public health needs of the community.

By Township

Preble County has approximately 24.0% of its population in Washington Township which includes the city of Eaton. The least populated township is Dixon with 1%. The rest of the population is relatively evenly distributed among the remaining townships. Corresponding to this distribution for 2024 was the distribution of various measures taken by the health department. The number of interactions and the time spent by the health department with township residents is approximately on track with population. Additionally, the number of communicable diseases reported also is approximately in line the population distribution, with a slightly higher rate in Washington Township. The graph below is an illustration of these measures.
